TOWN MEETING ANNOUNCEMENTS

All town meetings are open to the public, and members of the community are encouraged to attend! Complete minutes are, or will be, available on the Pittman Center web site. Below, is a brief overview of each board meeting.

At the August 12th **Planning Commission** meeting commissioners discussed short-term rentals (*no action was taken*) and approved a subdivision of land of the Audie Kear property.

At the **BMA** meeting on August 15th, Board Members:

- 1. Discussed short-term rentals and finalized a joint Planning Commission and Board of Mayor and Aldermen meeting to further discuss and have citizen input on the topic.
- 2. The Board wanted further information before participating in the State of Tennessee Local Government Investment Pool.
- 3. The Board did not participate in the USACE Sevier County Flood Preparedness Study due to a lack of information regarding possible preemptive warning systems in relation to flooding.
- 4. Appointed Jim Coykendall to replace Jody Trammel, who resigned due to moving, on the Planning Commission
- 5. Approved resolution No. 220 to apply for a "Safety Partners" Matching Grant Program through Public Entity Partners (Insurance Provider).

DID YOU KNOW ...?

Herb Williford: Community Leader and Expert Craftsman

Herb's long life began in Dandridge, where his family lived until Douglas Lake was built. He was one of five brothers with two sisters and deep family roots in the area. Herb recalls Dandridge would be under water had several townswomen not gone to Washington and persuaded TVA to build a dike around the town. The Williford home was in the dike's path, so the family moved to White Pine where his father joined a relative in operating a grist mill. Herb learned to operate the mill and picked up carpentry skills before joining his brother in highway construction, working on Boyd's Bridge in Knox County and many more in the region. He was helping build a new road from Gatlinburg to Pittman Center in 1950 when he met his future wife, Betty Branam, and within a few months began a happy marriage that lasted almost 50 years before she passed away.

Herb served in the U.S. Air Force in Okinawa from 1952 to 1955 then settled down at the head of Spring Branch near Betty's family and built his present house in 1960 on 22 acres. He helped build the original

Gatlinburg tramway and worked with Clon Owenby on a sawmill they built in Emerts Cove, grew sorghum and made molasses (as featured in an episode of ' On the Road with Charles Kuralt still found on YouTube). Herb remembers Clon as a 'sensible man' with good skills, developed working for Little River Lumber Company.

Herb began working for Great Smoky Mountains National Park in 1976, first on the trail crew then for many years on the historic buildings crew. His experience with grist mills came in handy repairing Cable and Mingus mills as well as many houses, barns and churches. He especially enjoyed working in the remote and peaceful Cataloochee Valley.

Herb retired from the Park in 1993 and has since stayed busy woodworking: he made furniture, bird houses, wooden toys and three beautiful grandfather clocks. He grew a large garden until he tired of fighting groundhogs and now just enjoys watching them. He helped build the Pittman Center covered bridge, was a

featured craftsman at Heritage Days, active in Hills Creek Baptist Church, and a founder and longtime member of the Pittman Center Volunteer Fire Department. His daughter Rosemary Nichols continues that tradition as fire chief. Rosemary and her sister, Lisa White live nearby and the whole family takes good care of Herb. He enjoys visitors and makes delicious strawberry preserves.

Sevier Animal Care Center



Pittman Center joins the county and other incorporated towns to support the new Sevier Animal Care Center. Located at 1040 Dolly Parton Parkway, the non-profit facility opened Nov. 1, 2018 under the direction of Ashley Thomas. The staff assists Sevier County Sheriff's Animal Control officers by caring for stray, abused and owner-surrendered companion animals, reunites lost pets with owners and matches homeless pets with loving new families. Director Thomas emphasizes that 'the Animal Care Center is part of the community and the community is part of us'. They welcome volunteers to assist with cuddling cats, walking dogs, fostering very young animals, preparing enrichment treats, photographing adoptable pets and cleaning. (www.sevieranimalcarecenter.com) The site provides details and also lists useful donations such as office supplies, cleaning materials, pet carriers and bedding.

The shelter provides a clean, cheerful and

safe environment for animals awaiting adoption. Cats enjoy a climate-controlled, quiet space with large enclosures featuring tunnel-cubbies for napping; dogs have trampoline-like beds and lots of toys and treats. Outside a spacious lawn next to the river provides a place for dogs to play and relax a few hours every day in shaded enclosures.



Stray animals are kept for 72 hours

before becoming available for adoption, or longer if leads on ownership are found. The adoption fee for dogs is \$75, for cats \$50, and includes vaccinations, de-worming, microchip and spay/neuter. Trial adoptions are routine to ensure compatibility.

Whether you are looking for a new companion or would just like to help out, keep the Sevier Animal Care Center in mind and help support this valuable asset to our community.
