

MEET OUR PITTMAN CENTER ELEMENTARY PRINCIPAL

This fall I began my 27th year with the Sevier County School System. I was a middle school math teacher for many years at Pigeon Forge Middle School. Later I taught math at Catons Chapel Elementary before becoming their assistant principal. In 2013, I became the principal at Pittman Center Elementary. I have seen a lot of changes in education over the years but believe the one factor that remains the same is that holding students to the highest of standards while forming strong relationships is how kids learn best. I have been married for 29 years to my husband Greg. We have one daughter Rylie who recently began her junior year at the University of Tennessee.

There is no such thing as a typical day in this line of work. School begins with daily announcements and the pledge. I try and visit all classrooms on a daily basis and stay very visible in the hallways. If there are no interruptions a student is scheduled to have academic classes, special area classes, RTI, lunch and physical movement every day. We have very high expectations at Pittman Center but offer lots of love and support along the way!

I would like for everyone to know what a huge honor our school recently received. In late summer I received notification from the Commissioner of Education that our school had been identified as a REWARD SCHOOL for the 2018-2019 school year. We had an overall accountability score greater than

3.1. This identification was made due to exemplary student success in achievement and growth.

There is no question what sets this school apart from the others:

THE PEOPLE WHO ENTER IT. In all of my years I have never worked with a more devoted group of educators who motivate, challenge and love every child that walks through the door. I have been blessed working alongside this faculty and staff and am proud to call them my colleagues and friends.

TOWN MEETING ANNOUNCEMENTS

All Town meetings are open to the public and members of the community are encouraged to attend! Complete minutes are, or will be, available on the Pittman Center website. Below, is a brief overview of each meeting.

The September 9th Planning Commission meeting and the September 19th Board of Mayor and Aldermen meetings were cancelled.

The Town held a special called meeting to host a joint Planning Commission and Board of Mayor and Aldermen workshop to discuss short-term rentals on August 29th. There was an enormous amount of citizen participation and input at this meeting. Just a reminder: this was a workshop and no action has been taken. Thank you for coming, your input is extremely valuable!

At the September 25th Tree Board meeting there was discussion of a UT Urban Forestry Program which plans to prepare a tree inventory of City Hall. The kudzu issue was also discussed. The Tree Board reviewed a draft tree ordinance with the City Administrator and Building Official. The Town is also celebrating its 11th year as a Tree City! The Town of Pittman Center will be applying to also be a "Bee City"! We will let you know when this comes to fruition.

The Planning Commission, Design Review Commission, and Board of Zoning Appeals will meet on October 14th at 4:30.

The Board of Mayor and Aldermen will meet on Thursday, October 17th at 4:30.

Reminder: Heritage Day will be April 25th, 2020


INFRASTRUCTURE/ PROJECT REPORT

Roads

Thank Sevier County Highway you Department for your excellent paving work! Over the last week and a half the Highway Department has been busy paving throughout the Town. Emerts Cove, Tudor Mountain, and Webbs Creek have been completely paved or had large portions of the road paved. Nell Rose and Tunis Rd. has had the worst spots paved and Copeland

has been paved where it connects to Highway 321. We were able to complete a significant number of paving projects this year due to the amount of money in our State Street Aid Fund, which legally must be

spent on roads.

Where's the Pavilion?

We have gotten several questions regarding the Town's plans for a pavilion behind City Hall. The Town is currently in the process of examining the pros and cons of applying for a Local Parks and Recreation Fund (LPRF) grant through Tennessee's Department of Environment and Conservation's (TDEC) Recreation Educational Services (RES). Our existing playground was funded with a LPRF grant! While grants are great and can provide an influx of funding for projects sometimes it can limit the scope or cause



unwanted conditions. The Town is working with Mitch Loomis from the East Tennessee Development District (ETDD) to walk through the application process to determine if a LPRF grant would be feasible. The next grant cycle will be due early summer 2020 and award announcements should be made by fall of 2020 (if the cycle and funding continues as it has historically). In the meantime, Town officials are meeting with health department officials to determine the feasibility of the proposed project location in relation to septic and field lines. The available funds and competing priorities are also being examined to determine which projects will be funded in the future. This is currently a future goal that is one of the Town's three-year goals as determined in the Town's Strategic Planning Session earlier this year.

DO YOU KNOW ABOUT TINKERGARTEN?

If you have driven by City Hall recently on Sunday afternoons or Monday mornings you may have noticed a pack of children running, spinning, singing, laughing, splashing, digging in the dirt or just generally having a good time in the fresh air. That is your local Tinkergarten class at its finest! That is what learning through play in an outdoor classroom looks like and is a proven way to give children the best foundation.

In today's fast-paced, technology-driven world, parents need to balance screen time with outdoor time to raise healthy, well-adjusted kids. 80+% of brain development occurs before the age of five. Children build foundational skills in these first five years that will affect the rest of their learning and life. When children play outdoors, under the right conditions, it inspires unique learning opportunities – they open up, push limits, tinker, create, and problem solve. Spending time in nature also provides children a wide range of health benefits including social and emotional well-being.



Research shows that time outdoors supports improved relationship skills, and reduces stress, anger, and aggression.

Tinkergarten is on a mission to elevate childhood. Local leader, Elizabeth Black, brings families together in a natural place in this community for these classes where kids learn through play. Each class becomes a tight-knit group of children and adults who learn together through expert-designed, outdoor play-based activities. She helps kids develop a host of important capabilities, including empathy, collaboration, creativity, persistence, and problem-solving. Her classes and activities help kids ages 18 months – 8 years develop core life skills while enjoying healthy, fun, engaging experiences in the physical freedom of our local green space.

Local classes are currently being held at the Pittman Center City Hall green space Sunday afternoons 4 – 5:15pm and Monday mornings 10 – 11:15am. Elizabeth will also be leading a "Tinkergarten Fall Lantern Walk", on November 3 at 5:15 p.m. – dusk, which is free and open to all who register and designed to help people of all ages welcome the darkness of the end of Daylight Savings time. DID YOU KNOW... Bee City USA: How you can help pollinators



One in three bites of food we eat is courtesy of insect pollination, and ninety percent of the world's flowering plants depend on pollinators to reproduce!

- 1. Provide diverse and abundant pollinator food sources (nectar and pollen from blooming plants) that bloom in succession from spring to fall.
- 2. Provide water for drinking, nest building and cooling, diluting stored honey and butterfly 'puddling'.
- 3. Build your habitat with mostly, if not all, native species of grasses, perennials, shrubs and trees. *Many native pollinators prefer or depend on the native plants with which they co-evolved for millions of vears.
- 4. Provide undisturbed spaces (leaf piles, un-mowed fields, fallen trees) for nesting and overwintering for native pollinators.
- 5. Use pesticide-free materials and source plants from nurseries that do not treat seeds with neonicotinoid pesticides, which permeate the entire plant and remain active for as much as years in woody plants. *Not all retailers reveal pesticide treatments on plant labels; sometimes a plant may be labeled "beefriendly" even though it was treated with a neonicotinoid- (systemic) pesticide.
- 6. Provide for safe and humane removal of honey bees when required.
- 7. Raise pollinator awareness by designating pollinator zones in public spaces with explanatory signage. Visit www.beecityusa.org for more information!


